WHAT DID YOU DO ON YOUR SUMMER VACATION? How Do We Know the Sacred?

Taking this 'back to school' cliché I began pondering where this summer has led; what has been encountered and experienced. I am pondering how in these and all moments we learn to see and experience connection to sacredness, connection to the experience of presence and mystery in all moments of our life. Some of the summer moments I am pondering:

- I spent a weekend in Chicago for the 60th Annual Benson Family Reunion (my mom's mother's side of the family). About 80 folks, re-viewed the family tree, played yard games, viewed pictures and notes from each year's reunion, shared food, during the annual family meeting we noted new family births and deaths.
- While in Chicago I also connected with friends with whom I grew up - rich, poignant and a lot of graciousness to each other as we grow older.
- I watched the live stream General Convention announcement of our new Presiding Bishop elect.
- General Convention approved liturgies of marriage which include all persons who seek faithful, committed relationships 'and the holy love which enables those in such relationships to see in each other the image of God'.
- Nine persons were shot and killed during a bible study at Emmanuel Church in Charleston.
- The Sunday after the Emmanuel Church shootings the Ft. Wayne Children's Choir sang here serendipitously having prepared several spirituals for our liturgy.
- At the Wild Goose Festival we participated in a Eucharist led by 'The Liturgists' which had me wiping tears of many emotions numerous times. Deeply profound.
- We observed an anniversary of the death of a friend's child and the fourth anniversary of daughter Gina and son-in-law Tom's wedding.
- Celebrated mom's XX birthday and helped her move three days later.

- Made it through my annual pilgrimage of watching three weeks of the Tour de France (or should I say Becky made it through my pilgrimage). Someday I will find that cycling team who wishes a chaplain for the Tour.

This is a partial list that doesn't include praying with the EYC and adults before their trip to Cuba, Milly's sermon on the beheading of John the baptizer, All Souls July 4 picnic, each day seeing through my office windows the work of our roof replacement, and many, many more moments.

As I reflect back on the summer I reflect on life's many chapters and moments: great joys, great awe, great sadness, great pain, great richness, great pause and banquets throughout. I see many threads flowing throughout, sometimes connecting and sometimes leaving empty spaces. I am pondering what allows us to see all of these moments as part of a whole; pondering how we understand the painful, the empty moments as every bit the truth of life, every bit as life giving and forming as are the abundant overflowing banquets. None negate or trump the other. All are part of the fabric that is the place of our encounter with the Sacred. What is it that instills in us the ability to see this?

We are about to enter the fall calendar with new grade levels of school and Sunday School. I am also conscious of John Westerhoff's quote that more is learned, more is formed and shaped, on a retreat weekend than in a year of Sunday School.

I realize I learn to see the threads, the connectedness, the Sacred, through my life with you. It is going through our lives, our rituals, our moments as a community remembering to and with each other all of this is the place of God, the place of the Sacred. It is our intentionality of remembering Who is seen in all people and moments. It is our intentionally practicing this as we live in each chapter and moment. Sunday School helps to name and teach things, and it is one of the 168 hours of our living week. What have the other 167 hours taught, shaped, called, spoken to us? How do we learn not only to see the Sacred in all moments but to know it?

ALL SOULS YOUTH AND CHILDREN'S CHOIRS BEGIN NEW, EXCITING SEASON

The time has now come to think about activities for the Fall and joining the All Souls Children's and Youth Choral Program! A fun-filled year is being planned! Choir registration and the first rehearsal will take place **September 2.**

The All Souls Children's and Youth Choral Program is divided into two separate choral groups. The St. Nicholas Choir is for boys and girls *5 years of age through 2nd grade*, and the St. Cecilia Choir welcomes all those in *3rd grade through high school*. The choristers sing in church twice a month at the 9:00 service, and on occasion they have the opportunity to sing four-part music with the adults singing the bottom three parts!

Continuing this fall, choristers in both choirs will be participating in a music education program produced by the Royal School of Church Music called *A Voice for Life*. This program is a fun method that promotes an enduring understanding of liturgy and music that the choristers will take with them into their adulthood. Through *A Voice for Life*, the choristers will have the opportunity to build their

August 23-30

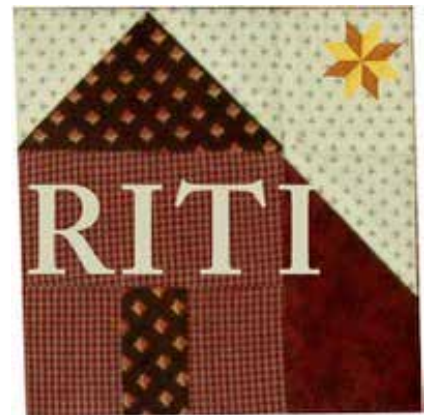

About The Author

Colm Tóibín is an Irish novelist, short story writer, essayist, playwright, journalist, critic and poet. He was born on May 30, 1955 in Enniscorthy in the southeast of Ireland. His grandfather, Patrick Tobin, was a member of the IRA, as was his grand-uncle Michael Tobin. Tóibín's father was a teacher who participated in the founding of Ireland's Republican Party.

At 17, he read *The Essential Hemingway*, which developed in him a fascination with Spain. Hemingway's literary influence was profound, especially "the sheer pleasure of the sentences and their rhythms, and the amount of emotion living in what was not said, what was between the words and the sentences." After graduating from University College Dublin in 1975 he left for Barcelona, a sojourn that partly inspired his first novel, 1990's *The South*.

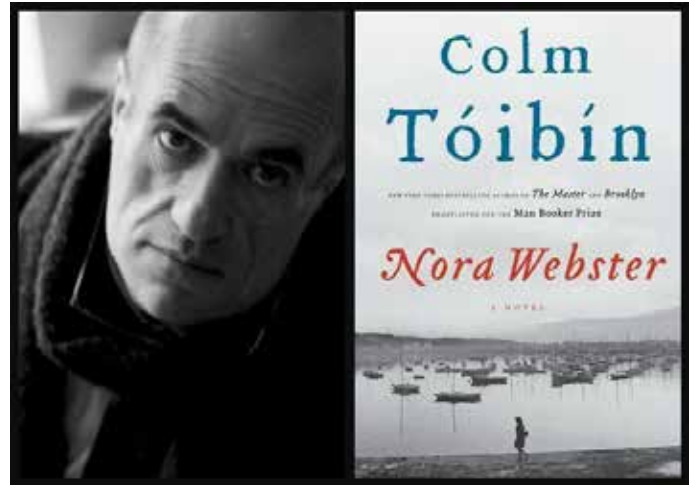
In 2014, he released *Nora Webster*, his seventh novel, and his first since *Brooklyn* (2009).

Openly gay and coming from a politically active lineage, Tóibín has been an outspoken proponent for the LGBT culture. In 2002, he published a collection of his essays entitled *Love in a Dark Time: Gay Lives from Wilde to*

Almodóvar. And in 2015, ahead of the Marriage Equality referendum, Tóibín delivered a talk titled "The Embrace of Love: Being Gay in Ireland Now" at Trinity Hall (the University of Dublin). [Adapted from *Wikipedia*]

About the Novel

Set in Wexford, Ireland, Colm Tóibín's superb seventh novel introduces the formidable, memorable and deeply moving *Nora Webster*. Widowed at forty, with four children and not enough money, Nora has lost the love of her life, Maurice, the man who rescued her from the stifling world to which she was born. And now she fears she may be drawn back into it. Wounded, strong-willed, clinging to secrecy in a tiny community where everyone knows your business, Nora is drowning in her own sorrow and blind to the suffering of her young sons, who have lost their father. Yet she has moments of stunning empathy and kindness, and when she begins to sing again, after decades, she finds solace, engagement, a haven - *herself*. *Nora Webster* is a masterpiece in character study by a writer at the zenith of his career, "beautiful and daring" (*The New York Times Book Review*) and able to

CENTERING PRAYER WORKSHOP

August 22, 9:30a.m.

Rev. Nancy Mills will again offer a workshop at All Souls Cathedral on the Basic Tools of a Christian Contemplative Prayer Practice: An Introduction to the Jesus Prayer and the Centering Prayer Method

Mother Nancy moved here to the Asheville area from the Diocese of Georgia where she has had an active ministry as a Spiritual Director and Retreat Leader and as chair of the Georgia Diocesan Spiritual Life Commission. She served as Chaplain to the Search Committee for the present Bishop of Georgia.

As a past member of the Order of St. Helena, an Episcopal Benedictine religious order for women her studies have ranged from the Carmelite Christian mystical tradition of St. Teresa of Avila and St. John of the Cross to teachings about relationship with the Beloved from the Sufi poets Rumi and Hafiz.

She is offering a brief introduction and experience of the Jesus Prayer which is the classic Christian mantra out of the Eastern Orthodox tradition. The Jesus Prayer is both a prayer in itself and a method for focusing the mind on the presence of God.

There will also be an introduction and experience of Centering Prayer. Centering Prayer is a method of Christian Meditation which opens the heart and mind to the presence of God as outlined by Fr. Thomas Keating the well-known director and founder of Contemplative Outreach, Inc.

As practical tools for living a mature Christian spiritual life these two traditional silent prayer practices lay the foundation for deeper relationship with God in the here and now. Together they form the basis of silent Christian Meditation which is a contemplative way of prayer.
