# WEDDINGS, ROOM IN THE INN, CATECHESIS, AND GREEN SPACE IN THE VILLAGE

*from the Very Rev. Todd Donatelli, Dean*

For years I have heard other cathedral deans speak of their space being used for outside weddings. By outside I mean weddings of persons not members of that faith community. In my first few years here we revisited all our wedding policies when in discernment about whose relationships in this faith community we would bless. We did not simply ask whether or not we would bless same gender relationships. We asked what is marriage? What does it mean to bless communally our couples? What do we ask of those wishing this blessing? What do we commit to them? In addition to determining we would not make gender a deciding factor of whose relationships we as a community would bless, we also determined as the Cathedral we would make available our space for weddings of Episcopalians in other WNC churches. As well, we determined for a number of reasons both pragmatic and philosophical we did not wish to make our space available for outside weddings.

For years I continued to hear from the other dean's ways this outside wedding income fed the mission and life of their cathedrals. I listened with interest and yet countered with (silently to myself and not out loud), "Well, at All Souls we are not some kind of wedding chapel." And I continued to hear their stories. At our Dean's Conference just before I went on sabbatical in 2014 the theme was using our buildings to support our mission. It was prompting us to consider how aging buildings might not simply be seen as a financial burden but a means of supporting our mission. Hmmm.

When we were at St. Paul's Within the Walls in Rome, Italy during sabbatical I saw over time what ministry was made possible through their allowing outside weddings. I saw older buildings, shifting demographics, hunger to be involved in mission beyond themselves. It all floated around in my head/soul as I looked at their life in Rome,

their Italian tiled roof, as well as the myriads of people flowing in and out of their doors finding refuge from and finding strength to participate in the life of that city. I found myself pondering if or when it would be that All Souls might take this step.

A couple of months after our return I was in a conversation with folks during a parish dinner about the life and ministry of All Souls. Participation in the wider community, offerings of spiritual formation, caring for an old building were among the topics as well as support for all of this life in changing times. Several folks, without any prompt from me, asked, "Have we ever thought about allowing people to rent our space for weddings? Do you know what people pay for weddings in Asheville?" I replied with why we had determined not to do so in the past and also offered my observations of Rome and other cathedrals in this country and abroad. I then said, "I am guessing All Souls will find it wishes to take this step some time down the road."

At this year's Vestry retreat in February it was determined we would take that step. It created an ad hoc group of parishioners and vestry members to research practices of other congregations both in Asheville and beyond. Their work encompassed over 100 congregations as well as conversations with local wedding consultants, persons at Biltmore, the Bohemian, the Bishop, our diocesan chancellor, and various other persons in the wedding field.

From this they submitted a proposal for a written agreement and pricing list for outside weddings to the Vestry which was approved at its June meeting. Among the things they have taken into account is making sure these additional weddings will not compromise our own members abilities to have dates open for weddings. Information about outside wedding agreements and pricing can be found on our website.

The Vestry, as with prior vestries, discerns continually what we wish to be as a faith community and as a cathedral. They ask and discern how we support our life and mission, how we support our participation in the world about us. Those answers include opportunities for formation such as Catechesis of the Good Shepherd, Autumn Grace and liturgies. They include engagement in the wider community such as Room in the Inn and Children First. They include making our space from the yard, benches and playground to the buildings a place of gathering, solace, and centering for all who pass through. They also include utilization of our space, allowing our buildings to work for us and not simply be a financial burden to us, as a way in which we are able to support what feeds the life of God in all these manifestations.

Be careful what you say you will never do or the things about which you hold a certain pietistic feeling about yourself: i.e. 'We will never rent out our space for weddings.' I also don't wish to be in a position of choosing to support work in the community or upkeep of these buildings. How do we do all the above? We keep praying. We keep listening. We keep talking. We find pathways.

# WHY ARE THEY IN ARMENIA?

*from Schell and Peter Alexander*

*Schell and Peter Alexander are Christian youth workers in the remote Asian country of Armenia. Schell grew up at All Souls, the daughter of the late Herschel and Eleanor Ponder. The Alexanders performed "Ponder Anew," based on Herschel's book about service as a pilot in World War II, at All Souls. Schell has sent this letter to the parishioners of All Souls.*

More than twelve months ago we stepped off a plane with a couple of suitcases each and moved to Armenia. Some of you are certainly wondering why and the rest of you are probably trying to remember if you've even heard of Armenia, much less where on this planet it might be located. The where is easy – Armenia is a small country about the size of Maryland to the east of Turkey, north of Iran, west of Azerbaijan and south of (former Soviet) Georgia. The "why?" Well, that takes a little more effort.

After twenty years at Young Life's Windy Gap camp in Weaverville, Pete and I were approached with the opportunity to develop a former Soviet youth camp located in the mountains of Armenia, into a Young Life camp to serve the ministry already happening in Armenia. If you know anything about Young Life, you know that camping is a big part of the overall mission. (If you don't know anything about Young Life, check out the website at [www.younglife.org](http://www.younglife.org))

While our peers are entering the empty nest stage of life ready for some stability, we felt God's nudge that there might be something else for us. We'll never be as unencumbered as we are right now with our health and without any grandkids. Add to that our combined skills in camp development and administration and it was a match made, literally, in heaven.

Once we got here we hit a few "bumps," ok, some roadblocks. There were some legal issues that needed to be navigated before we could move full steam ahead and so we were essentially put into a holding pattern for almost nine months. However, those months were an important opportunity for us to gain the knowledge that we need to move forward in getting the camp remodeled and up and running.

From language acquisition (since our arrival, we have learned Eastern Armenian enough to get by but not enough to have a deep conversation) to business and construction practices. We've been on a steep learning curve that could not have happened without an extensive "training" period. What sometimes felt like lost time was, in fact, necessary time. God knows what he is doing and it is always good to get that reminder every so often!

We are all settled here in Armenia for the next couple of years. We've been here long enough that family has started to visit us over here. We are just wrapping up a visit with my sister, Anne Ponder, and will ship her back to the USA full of stories and a fair amount of culture shock. Be sure to ask her about her experience when you see her! We'll

also see our kids, Kathryn and Sam, in the next few weeks – how we miss them. Easily, the hardest part of living overseas is being away from our family. We are so grateful that they would make the effort to come and be with us.

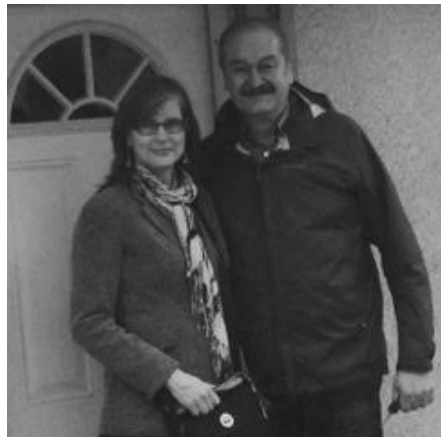
We could never have expected how hard nor how rewarding this experience would be for us. Now that the legal issues have been navigated, the construction is back on track and Young Life Expeditions teams working in Armenia since late May to help us with the remodeling efforts and to help minister to teens with the local Young Life

staff. We will host groups through October, all the while continuing to serve as liaison between Young Life and the Armenian project manager, vendors and government.

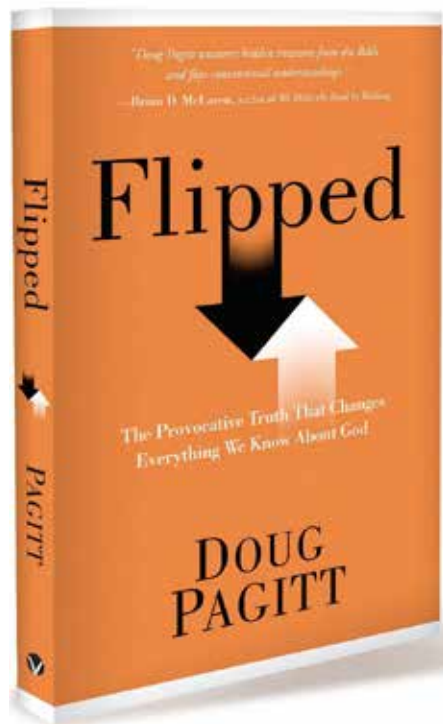

# WHY JOIN, ANYTHING?

*From the Rev. Canon Thomas Murphy*

When I was in grade school, a fad swept our school with the thorough intensity of an outbreak. The fashion symptoms included the sudden development of almost entire classes wearing bland colored, utilitarian jackets, distinguished only by the simple moniker declaring, "Members Only."

My mom, ever practical, instead quietly purchase a much cheaper jacket that looked almost the same but instead declared I was a member of the knock off brand the "Man's Club." (My spiritual director thinks this is significant.) This fad lasted for a couple of years before quietly subsided under the pressure of the dreaded flannel outbreak of the 1990s (which I quickly joined thanks to my grandfather's clothes closet).

I was thinking about these jackets recently and wondered, why? Why did everyone seem to want to be a part of anything that marked you off from everyone who didn't own something tailored for "Member's Only." I think because some part of each of us doesn't want to be left out. Even if we only secretly desire to be asked in order to refuse. Better that than not being asked at all, the horror of the unpicked grade school child, watching from the sidelines, waiting for someone to look over and ask them to join in the game.

So, why do we feel the need to join, anything? Social and behavior scientists have no doubt written many fine studies on this very question, likely pointing out survival advantages or the need for a communal effort in

nurturing off-spring. But what this brought to mind for me, an Episcopal priest, was one of God's observations about humankind.



Even from the beginning of time, God reflects that "It is not good for the man to be alone." I think our desire to join springs from this early insight. Goodness is discovered and magnified as people join together in their common lives. Of course, so is evil. The choices we make lead to the groups we join because human kind was created for community.

So why join this community? Perhaps, it is because you wish to have a greater impact in our larger community through the outreach of the Cathedral. Maybe it is because you leave feeling as if a load you carry has been lifted off by the music, or the prayers, or Eucharist. So unencumbered you function as a better Dad, a more patient daughter, or as a kinder neighbor. It could be something you hear in a sermon carries you out into the world and reframes the way you function day by day.

I realize I can't really know all the reasons why people join but you can know it is our members are how I best see the work of God in the world. Thank you for joining.
