RAISE THE ROOF AND OTHER THOUGHTS

I have never been so excited to see these kinds of bids. A little background would be helpful: In 2010 we reroofed the end of the church with the round conical form. Given these tiles were all unique in size and shape each tile had to have a custom form made for their creation. This made the renovation cost per square foot significant. As we considered what it would cost to replace the remainder of the church roof and the roof of Zabriskie Hall, (two 1896 roofs which had never been replaced) we knew they would cost less per square foot as they would be standard size tiles. At the same time a simple 'guesstimate' figured the cost of both would be somewhere over a million dollars. Given our 2011 campaign 'Generation to Generation' had as part of its purpose funds for continued roof repair, and given we have \$310,000 in funds collected from that campaign for further roof work, we figured we would have to approach the roofs one at a time.

In April we received three bids for work on both roofs. All three came in at around \$500,000 to replace both roofs. (Yes, our 'guesstimation' math was a bit imperfect- thank God). The bid taken was around \$500,000 with a 10% contingency for any extra work which might be found once all tiles are removed. With this lower price in mind (\$500,000 to \$550,000 to finish all the 1896 roofs) and as we have the \$310,000 collected with a few pledges still coming in, the Properties and Finance Committee and Vestry have decided to complete both roofs now. The potential inflation and the potential for more damage (we have tiles missing on both roofs) in putting off work on either roof contributed to this decision. Thus, my comment of being so excited to see such bids. Once these two roofs are completed we will have in the past 12 years accomplished the following:

1. Complete modernization of all electrical systems in the 1896 buildings.
2. Complete replacement of the 1896 roofs (whose new life span will be 120 years).
3. Underground drainage installed to address moisture deterioration around the foundations of these buildings.
4. Complete restoration of all windows, both stained glass and clear glass, in these buildings.
5. Complete renovation of the kitchen including installation of handicap accessible bathrooms.
6. Completion of handicap accessibility in all our sidewalks including making them capable of supporting accessible vehicles.
7. Installation of fencing around the campus providing both safety and beauty.
8. Air conditioning of Zabriskie Hall and the 1950's addition.
9. Provision in the Endowment Fund for annual income to support regularly scheduled maintenance including things such as regular painting of the buildings as well as replacement of furnaces and other large ticket items.

Raise the Roof and Other Thoughts

This means upon completion of the roof work all major aspects of these buildings, roof, electrical, windows, water drainage, and income for sustained maintenance will have been addressed. Upon completion of the roof we will have put these buildings on a solid and significant path of restoration and regular care. This work has not been simple nor has it come cheaply. It has involved two campaigns (2003 Foundations for the Future and 2011 Generation to Generation) as well as numerous estate gifts which have contributed both to immediate restoration as well as the creation of the Adams Endowment Fund for building maintenance.

You will already have seen work begun on the roofs by the time you read this. Our contractor's time frame has them completing work on Zabriskie Hall before the Food Booth/Craft Fair. They will begin work on the church after Food Booth completing all work before the winter months.

You may be wondering how we will be paying for the balance of the roof work above the funds collected from Generation to Generation: \$500,000 to \$550,000 minus around \$320,000 (\$310,000 plus remaining pledges coming in) equals a balance somewhere between \$180,000 to \$230,000. Please stay tuned as the Vestry and the Finance Committee are working on approaches to this balance.

In the meantime I find myself looking out my office window and seeing work being done that will affect congregants here for the next 120 years. I am trying to comprehend what that means for those who will be gathered here throughout that time. We talk about living in the communion of saints. I am imagining saints gathered here for the next 120 years.

SABBATICAL

From the Rev. Canon Thomas Murphy

A mentor of mine once told me that “good congregations form good priests.” Looking back over the last 9 years I have worked at the Cathedral in many different roles in ministry, I have no doubt that All Souls is a good, or rather, a great congregation. The second part is still a work in progress. However, I believe all priests, if honest, would admit they also are works in progress.

What I do know is that in celebrating my fifth anniversary of being ordained, I have been stretched, challenged, and supported more than I could have ever anticipated. I remember my first sermon here, fittingly on the Sunday we remember the doubting disciple Thomas. As I recall, I gave a twelve minute sermon (timed carefully by my wife at home) in about 7 minutes from the pulpit. I remembered how my first time serving as a deacon, I read the wrong gospel, bid the prayers by asking people to pray for God, spilled the wine all over the credence table, then dismissed everyone by asking them to “go in love, to serve and peace the Lord.” As my good friend Fr. Brian reminded me afterwards, “every clergy has made those same mistakes, but not perhaps making them all at the same service.”

In my time at All Souls, I have learned quite a bit from my mistakes. I have learned to find my way through the twisted maze of the Mission Hospital Complex. I now know there are times when just showing up during a time of grief is more important than having the right words to say. I have come to understand just how central the laity is to the functioning and flourishing of our community. After this time, I appreciate how hard the vestry works, thinks, and prays for the ministries internally and externally of the Cathedral. I also have gained some unexpected knowledge; such as learning more about 100 year old roofs that I ever anticipated. This congregation guided me on the path to form me into the priest I hope one day to become.

A gracious part of this formation is also the opportunity every five years to be granted a sabbatical; a time I plan to pattern after most sabbatical grants that promote elements of prayer, study, worship, and respite. My own sabbatical will begin on May 22nd after helping host the annual Children’s First Fundraiser held at the Cathedral. My plans include initially time



set apart for finishing up several writing projects including a draft of a book I have been working on for several years.

I also plan to delve into a field of a discipline called Found Theology explored by theologian Ben Quash. This field examines objects and looks at how their arrangement and juxtaposition creates a complex matrix of contextual symbolic significance. In the church world this relates to our liturgical sensibilities in how elements within our worship spaces convey certain theological meanings. In other words, really nerdy stuff which I love!

As many of you know, I was also elected as a delegate to General Convention, held this summer in Salt Lake City. Our family plans to travel out there a week early and spend some time camping around southern Utah. I anticipate attending General Convention will equally provide a learning experience of the width and breadth of the Episcopal Church in the United States.

Following our return to Asheville, I plan to spend a week at Holy Cross Monastery in New York State. I find that community especially adept at helping model for me ways to improve my prayer life and deepen my spirituality. I believe that the monk’s understanding of time is something that deeply contrasts the way our culture urges people to live. For me, their use of silence serves as a type of resistance to addictive busyness that so consumes the routines of my life. On returning, I plan to spend a week at the beach with my family before returning in late August.

Please know, no clergy that I know of takes for granted the opportunity that our congregation’s afford to allow for a time of sabbatical. I hope that my time away and the concentration on study, prayer, worship, and respite will allow me to return energized and ready to better resume a leadership role in this amazing spiritual community. I feel blessed to serve as the assistant at the Cathedral, and look forward to sharing on my return.

About The Author

Hilary Mary Mantel, born in Glossop, Derbyshire, about 15 miles east of Manchester, England, on July 6, 1952, is an English writer whose work includes personal memoirs, short stories, and a dozen novels. She has explored her family background, the mainspring of much of her fiction, in her 2003 memoir, *Giving Up the Ghost*.

After graduating from the University of Sheffield in 1973, Mantel worked in the social services department of a geriatric hospital and then as a sales assistant in a department store.

In 1972, she married Gerald McEwen, a geologist. In 1977, they moved to Botswana, where they lived for the next five years. Later, they spent four years in Jeddah, Saudi Arabia. McEwen eventually gave up geology to act as Hilary's business manager.

In 1974, she began writing a novel about the French Revolution. However, her first published novel, *Every Day*



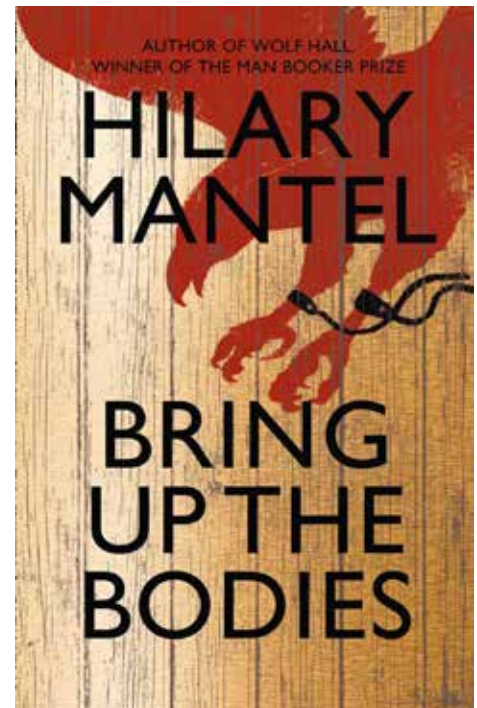

Is Mother's Day, appeared in 1985. *Wolf Hall*, about Henry VIII's minister Thomas Cromwell, was published in 2009 to critical acclaim and won that year's Man Booker Prize. Its sequel, *Bring Up the Bodies*, was published in 2012 and also won the Man Booker Prize; at which time the Chairman of the Prize Committee said of Mantel and these novels: "We have the greatest modern English prose writer reviving possibly one of the best known pieces of English history." To complete a trilogy, *The Mirror and the Light* is scheduled for publication this summer.

About The Novel

Though he battled for seven years to marry her, Henry VIII is disenchanted with Anne Boleyn. She has failed to give him a son and her sharp intelligence and audacious will alienate his old friends and the noble families of England. When the discarded Katherine (Henry's first wife) dies in exile from the court, Anne stands starkly exposed, the focus of gossip and malice.

At a word from Henry, Thomas Cromwell is ready to bring her down. Over three terrifying weeks, Anne is ensnared in a web of conspiracy, while the demure Jane Seymour stands waiting her turn for the poisoned wedding ring. But Anne and her powerful family will not yield without a



ferocious struggle. Hilary Mantel's *Bring Up the Bodies* follows the dramatic trial of the queen and her suitors for adultery and treason. To defeat the Boleyns, Cromwell must ally with his natural enemies, the papist aristocracy. What price will he pay for Anne's head? (Goodreads.com)

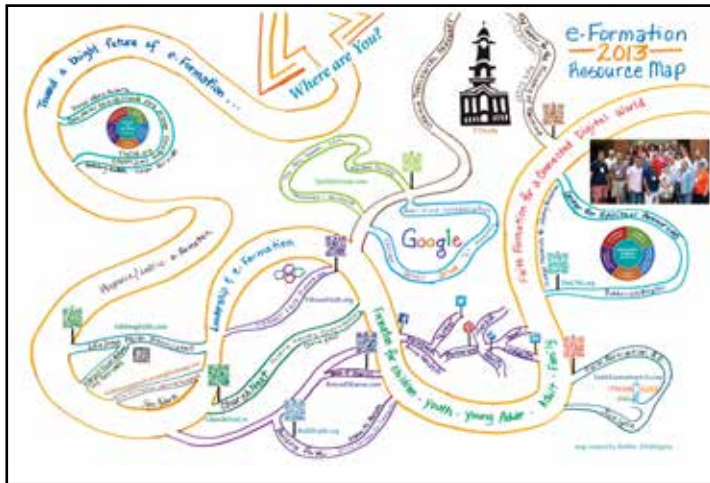

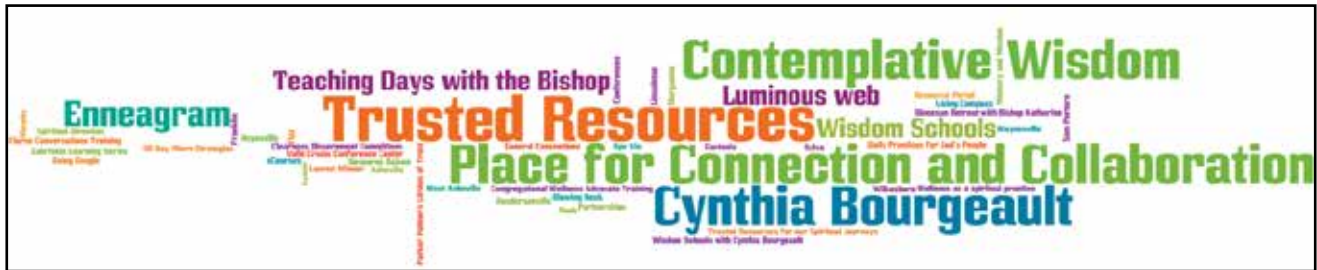
eFormation map I created for Virginia Seminary

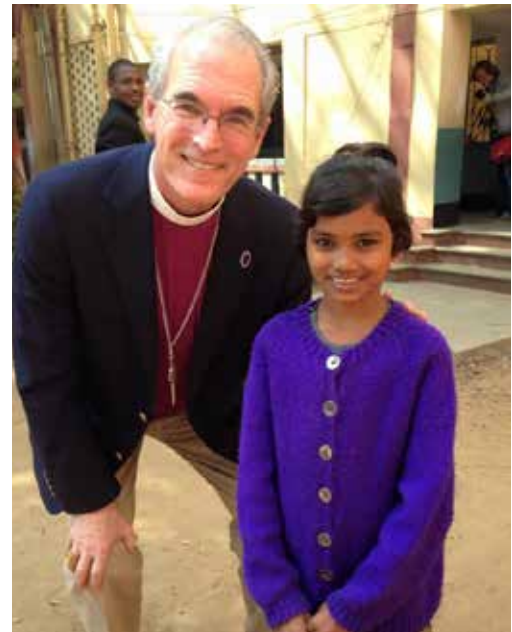

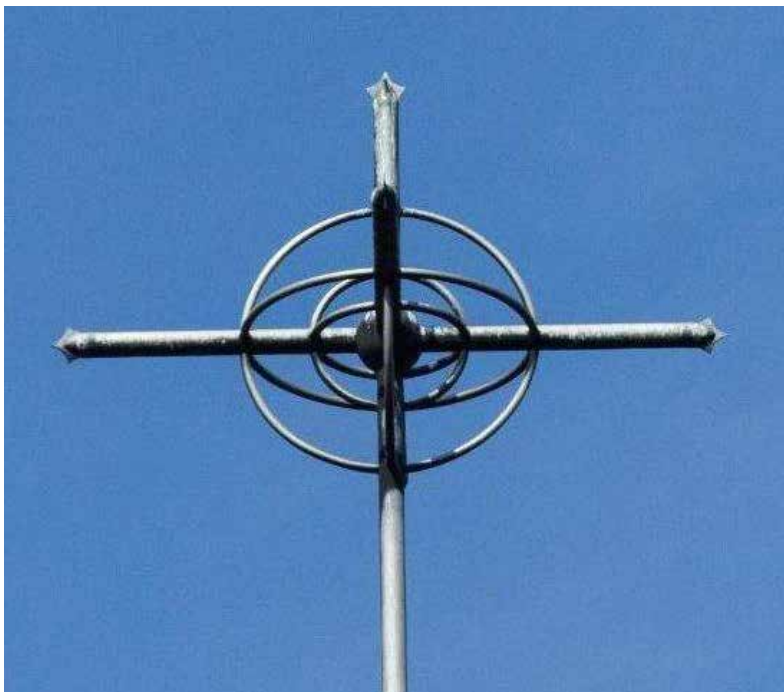


DID YOU KNOW?

ALL SOULS EXPERIENCE: SENIOR LUNCH BUNCH

Watch out when a group of seniors put their heads together. Chances are, the outcome will be fun, informational, and include great food. Such is the formula for Senior Lunch Bunch. In June, the program committee, which meets once a year, will gather to look at exciting events for the coming year. On hiatus during the summer, fall programs begin in September.

Deerfield resident Bob Blank has led Senior Lunch Bunch for the past three years (heading into his fourth). He inherited the reins from Mason Wilson, who had championed the group for six years.

“Our new participants on the program committee, Bob and Gail MacLean, are joining Pru Wilson, Anne Kime and me to plan what promises to be a wonderful group of programs,” said Bob Blank. Bob is no stranger to program planning. In his career in academia, he used to line up speakers for the honorary fraternity, Phi Beta Kappa.

When Senior Lunch Bunch began some 10 years ago, attendance was high with groups as large as 40 enjoying the camaraderie. But over the years, the numbers have declined, largely due to participants who are not as active as they used to be. Current attendance typically runs up to 20. Bob Blank hopes to see the numbers rise as fall programs ensue.

As mentioned previously, fall programming for Senior Lunch Bunch kicks off in September and continues with third Wednesday programs in October and November. The group does not meet in December or January, but resumes in February and continues through May.

From personal experience, I thoroughly enjoyed attending Senior Lunch Bunch in April. The speaker, All Souls’ own Robbin Whittington, introduced

attendees to The Living Compass Program, which provides a structure and process toward whole-person wellness. Each attendee was given a workbook in which we ranked our spirituality and our stress resiliency. After recording our rankings in the workbook, we broke into groups of three to discuss how we might proceed in our spiritual practice. It was an eye-opener for me, and I believe the other participants felt the same.

Each week Living Compass sends via email a one page reflection which connects current

happenings in the world to wellness. It is written by Rev. Dr. Scott Stoner, Executive Director of Living Compass, who draws on his 30 years as an Episcopal priest and family therapist and his love of making faith and wellness come alive in the everyday happenings of today’s world. Currently, this email reflection is received and enjoyed by thousands of people across the globe. To receive weekly wellness e-mails, go to www.livingcompass.org. It’s easy to sign up. I did it in less than a minute.

At this writing, the program committee had not yet met for the year, but Bob Blank said that a few of the programs under consideration include health & wellness, sleep, and a presentation by Care Partners, tentatively planned for the September program. In the past, Senior Lunch Bunch topics have included presentations by Simon Thompson of Wild Birds Unlimited, WLOS Weatherman Jason Boyer, health care proxies, AARP, and security, to name a few.

So, get out your calendars and circle Wednesday, September 16, for Senior Lunch Bunch at 12:30 p.m. Meetings are held in Zabriskie Hall. Bring a dish to share, and then make it a habit every third Wednesday!
