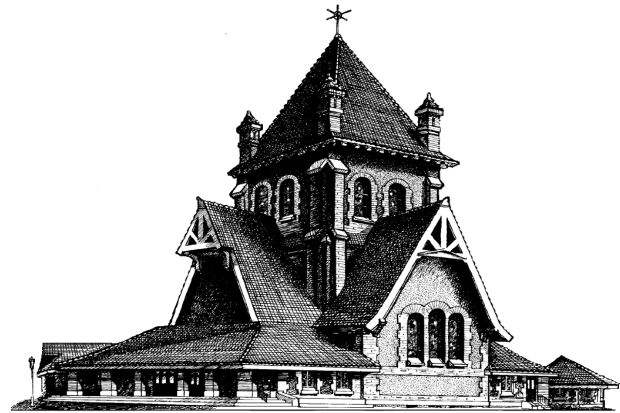
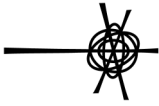

I always find it interesting to see what kind of things people have on the walls of their homes and offices. For me, they serve as icons into the things that have particular meaning for those persons. It is not a coincidence that in my office you will find an icon of St. Catherine, a chalice, a picture of the altar and baptismal font at St. Andrew's in Jackson, Mississippi, a poster of The Blues Brothers, a Far Side Calendar and various pictures of my family. All of these represent various moments that have formed and shaped me. They are experiences that have informed me about myself, the people in my life, the whole creation and how God is present to us.

Formation is a word that describes what it means to be growing in our relationship to God, and each other. Formation is the relationship between our life experience and the rituals/practices through which we see and understand those experiences. Family rituals and faith rituals give the context, the forming stories and experiences through which we see and learn. They connect us to our foundations and speak of our dreams. They tell us what is important to us and from where we have found hope and meaning as human beings.

I have often said that I cannot recall a single lesson from my fourth grade Sunday School class, but I can tell you a whole lot about our teachers and remember vividly the occasions where we were invited into their homes for special events. I can't recall the lectionary lessons or sermons of any particular season growing up, yet I can tell you in vivid details how the church appeared on Christmas Eve, during Lent and that there was deep teaching in the experience of being allowed to fall asleep in my parent's lap at midnight services. As well, I recall vividly playing on the floor of the diocesan 'thrift shop' where my mother volunteered regularly.

This booklet is a guide of formation. It describes the ways, the practices and rituals through which we at All Souls Cathedral find God, each other and our own lives. They remind us that God comes to us in many and varied ways. They remind us that it is our chosen commitment to each other and to God, our chosen commitment to communal rhythms and rituals that leads us into the life, mystery and hope of God.

May this guide be a companion in your and our being "formed in Christ" (St. Paul). May it lead to a deeper connection to God and all of God's creation.

### On Being the Diocesan Cathedral

Like our building in the village, the Center is becoming a hub for life in our diocese and beyond." The Center is a joint initiative of the Cathedral of All Souls and the Diocese of Western North Carolina.

## Family Ministries

Families, both those we choose and those we are born into, are central to our growth. *The Family Ministry* programs at All Souls seek to strengthen all of our family ties. The programs we offer are varied, yet they all seek to help us grow both individually and collectively as members of Christ's family on earth.

## Worship and Children

**Gospel for Children**—At both the 9 a.m. and 11:15 a.m. services the children are invited to the Children's Chapel during the gospel and sermon. They are led out just before the reading of the gospel, and they return at the Peace. Children's Chapel is patterned after the main service and includes the gospel reading, short homily/discussion of the gospel, and instruction about worship and our church year.

**Choirs**—Participation in worship by the St. Cecilia Choir and the St. Nicholas Choir greatly enhances our common worship. Please refer to the music section of this booklet for information about participation in the children's choirs.

**Nursery**—There are paid professionals staffing our nursery from 8:45 a.m. through the 11:15 a.m. service.

## Christian Formation for Children

Until the 1800's, Christian Formation was centered in the home. While we offer the opportunities listed below, we still affirm the home as the primary place of Christian education and formation. Our aim is to provide opportunities for all of us to grow in our understanding of our call as Christians at church and in our daily lives.

**Church School** – Our church school curriculum is lectionary-based, so families can discuss together what each has learned about that Sunday's readings. Additionally, we have given careful planning to include instruction on things particular to the Episcopal Church.

**Special programs** – During specific times of the year, such as Lent, additional Christian education programs are offered on weeknights, on Saturdays, or on the weekend.

**Vacation Bible School** – All Souls has teamed up with several other churches to offer "Marketplace" Bible school. The Marketplace focuses on a different aspect of the life and times of Jesus each year and offers a varied and multi-sensory experience in the lives of early Christians.

## Fun and Fellowship

In addition to the activities with a specific religious focus, there are several things which we do each year purely for fun and fellowship in our community.

The end of summer picnic is held toward the end of August. It is a good way to reconnect with old friends and meet new ones before the coming school year.

We worship in the undercroft of Trinity Episcopal (on Church Street) at 1:30 p.m. on Sundays (Holy Eucharist) and we also gather for midday prayer on Thursdays at 11:00 a.m. at A-Hope Day Shelter on Ann Street. While we follow liturgies known and familiar to Episcopalians, all worship at Church of the Advocate welcomes each participant to help lead us in the proclamation of God's good news and in teaching us all how to pray. On Sundays, simple hospitality is offered after worship and a nurse is on hand for basic medical care. ### **Cathedral Choir**

High school, college and adult singers are welcome  
Rehearsals: Wednesday evenings, 7:30 p.m. - 9:00 p.m.  
Sing: Sunday mornings at the 11:15 a.m. Eucharist

The Cathedral Choir warmly invites anyone who enjoys singing to consider taking part. If interested, please call Kyle Ritter, Canon for Music, at church, 274-2681. Basic note reading is a necessity to participate.

The Cathedral Choir sings a rich and varied repertoire of choral music, from plainchant and Renaissance motets to anthems by contemporary composers. On occasion, the choir performs large-scale compositions with orchestra. Throughout the year there are special musical opportunities such as the All Souls Service and Taizé liturgies.

### **Motet Choir**

Members of the Cathedral Choir are invited to participate  
Rehearsals: Wednesday evenings, 7:00 p.m. - 7:30 p.m.  
Sing: Once a month at the 9:00 a.m. and 11:15 a.m. Eucharists and some Holy Days

The Motet Choir is a smaller group of adult and high school students who come together once a month to rehearse and perform primarily a cappella music. Like the Cathedral Choir, the Motet Choir sings a rich and varied repertoire of music. The presence of a unique choral group to lead and inspire the music at our energetic 9:00 a.m. service is an important element of our music program.

### **St. Cecilia Choir**

Boys and girls 3<sup>rd</sup> grade through high school are welcome  
Rehearsals: Wednesday afternoons, 5:15 – 6:15 p.m.  
Sing: Sunday mornings primarily at the 9:00 a.m. Eucharist (occasionally at 11:15 a.m.)

Rehearsals consist of anthem learning, hymn singing, liturgy training, and all around fun! Choristers explore the rich heritage of musical styles in the Episcopal Church, examine the various symbols and traditions of the liturgical year, and learn how to participate more confidently in the worship of their church. The St. Cecilia Choir will occasionally be joined by members of the Motet Choir to sing four-part music!

### **St. Nicholas Choir**

Boys and girls 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> grades are welcome  
Rehearsals: Wednesday afternoons, 4:15 – 5:00 p.m.  
Sing: Sunday mornings primarily at the 9:00 a.m. Eucharist

The half-hour rehearsals consist of voice building and note reading exercises. Through musical games and echo-singing, choristers build musical confidence and “find their voice.” The St. Nicholas Choir learns music by rote and sings from memory. As a result, choristers are not expected to be able to read music or words. The goal of the St. Nicholas Choir is to prepare choristers to participate fully in the worship of the church and to move confidently into the St. Cecilia Choir.
